The United States now has 150,000, 101 telephones in use or one telephone for every 7 persons.

When we remember that the first word spoken through a telephone was only 48 years ago and the first complete sentence transmitted by telephone was only 47 years ago, we must admit that the telephone growth has been marvelous. In 1880 there were only 30,000 telephones, in 1890 the number had increased to 211,563, in 1900 it jumped to 676,733. The decade from 1900 to 1910 showed a greater gain than any similar period, bringing the total to 5,142,692. In 1920 we found the number had grown to 11,796,747 and for the period from 1920 to 1924 the gain was nearly a million a year.

The investment in telephone equipment by the Bell system and its 25 subsidiary companies now amounts to \$2,400,048,325. When we think of this vast amount of money it is astounding.

The only business that in any way rivals the telephone business is the motor business and the investment in that is far less than the telephone investment. The steel industry which is as old as the country is the only business that exceeds in investment the telephone.
