A COMMUNITY MISTAKE

At a special election held in one of the school districts of Griffin's township, Tuesday July 1st on the question of a special tax for schools, the movement failed by one vote.

A full review of the situation in the section, and considering its remoteness from any convenient and adequate school center, only serves to increase the sympathy of those interested in the welfare of the community.

This section is in many ways one of the finest sections in Martin county. No great amount of wealth and yet we find but very few poverty stricken families. Practically all good uniform lives and a good substantial new highway. This community retains many of the noble virtues of the olden times. They nurse the sick, bury the dead and protect the widows and orphans. They have good farms and homes and are good willing workers. Honest, prompt and accomodating. They are fully up with the times in nearly every thing; in fact they have cars and modern conveniences and all these lines should be classed as model community. Yet they are deficient and lacking in many respects.

They proceed on the theory that the old system of Education, under which they received their training, is good enough. There is something unexplainable about such a position. To see a man who wants to improve his home, his farm, his tools, his team, in fact every feature of his activities for better living conditions, until it comes to better schools, and then he halts.

To think of a man letting the material things of life take precedence over the future welfare of his child ignorance and the work of the devil only can be responsible for such a decision on the part of the individual. The truth is the school is the most needful of all other things mentioned. It is not so bad to leave off some of the modern material conveniences, but when we withhold the opportunities of a fair education for the children, or the children to be, we commit an inexcusable error.

Perhaps one of the greatest failures that man has, is the feeling of self-satisfaction and it may be that such thoughts too often netuate us. For any man to be satisfied with the existing order of things regardless of who he is, is a reflection upon the man and his mental capacity. Such a feeling by a community is worse. It

is detrimental to all in that it hurts the helpless.

The vote against the special tax can only mean that no child in the section can go above a simple primary grade, unless they leave home, at a heavy cost.

The amount of taxes that would have been raised if the election had been carried would be only enough to support one child in college for one year.
