STATE FARMERS CONVENTION WAS WELL ATTENDED

Raleigh, July 28.—Contrary to expectations, the annual convention of farmers and farm women held at State College last week was attended by a thousand or more people during each of the three days. At the close of the first day about 500 men and women had registered for rooms and many other hundreds had driven in for the day. A new feature of the convention this year was the string band brought in from Alamance County by President R. W. Scott. This band added much to the social side of the meeting and vied with the most popular speakers as an attraction. Its old fashioned tunes and its songs of long ago stirred the audience to an extent surpassed only by Senator E. D. Smith's wonderful challenge to farmers to organize for their own protection.

The Convention held a joint session for men and women on the morning of the opening day, July 23, and on the nights of July 23 and 24. All other meetings were in groups. The men met together on Thursday morning for a discussion of farm credits but at other times, the groups were gathered together to study farm crops and livestock. The annual meeting of the State Seed Improvement Association was held on the afternoon of the 24. The farm women held their meetings separately and heard reports on women's work as done in the different counties of the State.

The Convention this year was characterized by more discussion from the floor by farmers themselves. In the past, those in the audience have been content to let the speakers do the talking; but, this year, those who wished definite information about a particular subject had not hesitated in asking questions and in giving experiences. It seemed that the farmers have really come to look upon State College as their own institution and the Convention as their public forum.

COVER CROPS PAY IN TARHEEL ORCHARDS

Raleigh, July 28.—"Summers are long in North Carolina and the hot weather burns large amounts of nitrogen and humus from the ground between the trees in our orchards. A good cover crop planted in midsummer will not only lessen the amount burned off by shading the ground but will also add humus and nitrogen to the soil. Of course nitrogen will be added only when legume crops are planted," says W. A. Radspinner, assistant horticulturist for the State College Experiment Station.

Cover crops will prevent washing from rains of the fall and spring and since this is done both by the top which check the flow of water and the root system which permits the water to sink in, it is advisable to plant the crop soon enough for it to have made some root development before cold weather. Mr. Radspinner states that in many parts of North Carolina, particularly in the Sandhills, cowpeas are sowed in June, turned under in the fall and followed by rye and vetch which are turned under the following spring. Clean cultivation is then practiced to advantage until June again. This system is expensive but returns maximum amount of humus and nitrogen to the soil.

cover crop should be sown in the orchard to pre-

vide a good mat of growth over winter. Eye needs to go in by September first. This is one of the best cover crops but it not a legume and for this reason vetch is usually planted with it. About 1-2 bushels of rye and one bushel of vetch per acre are used when the two crops are planted alone. When used together, one bushel of rye and one-half bushel of vetch is sufficient. Soybeans and cowpeas should be planted in early summer to furnish nitrogen.

NOW TIME TO DUST COTTON

Raleigh, July 28.—Rain, one day after the next June, causes vegetative growth and hot, murky weather make conditions ideal for the cotton boll weevil and the pest is taking full advantage of the fact if reports coming to Franklin Sherman, chief of the Division of Entomology for the Experiment Station and Extension Service are true. The Division of Entomology has a number of field workers out in the State, several students from State College engaged in this work for the summer and boll weevil field laboratories in Edgecombe and Moore counties. Reports from these sources show that weevil infestation has rapidly increased.

"Some fields have only a few weevils," says Mr. Sherman, "but there are a great number which have reached the point of ten percent infestation at which time dusting with the dry calcium arsenate should begin. For every man to dust all of his cotton would be a needless waste, but for the careful man to dust properly when ten percent of his cotton square

"We can if we will—we WILL control the weevil" by applying methods of control approved by state and government experts.

Tests and experiments by experts prove that it pays to apply cultural methods of boll weevil control under all conditions and calcium arsenate is dust from where the soil will yield so much as one third of a bale to the acre.

Farmers should help their cotton crops to early fruiting and maturity before the boll weevils have had a chance to destroy them by planting selected seed and applying intensive cultivation.

Applications of calcium arsenate to dust form should be made on cotton when 10 per cent of the squares have been punctured by boll weevils. From five to seven pounds of poison should be used to the acre and the application should be repeated two or three times at four and five day intervals.

Others have proved that boll weevil control pays. Prove it yourself by using government methods and check the result of a small tract where control measures are not used.

Boll weevils go into winter quarters before frost occurs. Reduce the number by burning trash and burying the stalks as soon as the crop is gathered.

Apply calcium arsenate to dust form to boll weevil infested cotton when the air and the plants are moist, preferably at night.

Ask your county agent or write the state college of agriculture or the National Boll Weevil Control Association, Room 220 Whitney Building, New Orleans, La., about methods of boll weevil control.

have been punctured is only wise and profitable according to our experience." Mr. Sherman states that one may pick and burn all the infested squares and young bolls and secure some control if he has only a small acreage of cotton or if his infestation is low and there are some boys and girls on the farm that may be used in this work. But generally in late July and August, when the weather has been favorable for weevil development the only remedy which can be depended on for profitable production is the standard dust poison application.

"Some dusting has already begun in the eastern counties," says Professor Sherman. "This will be increased in August if the present infestations hold true. For those who do not know exactly how to apply the dust, we would advise them to get a copy of extension circular number 137 which may be had free of charge by writing the editor, extension division, Raleigh."
