ABOUT FICTITIOUS PRICES

Tobacco prophets are in all their self-imposed glory at this time of the year," said D. J. Archer, Richmond tobaccoist, Monday. "Here and there, their vague prophecies as to the prices to be paid are circulated to the consternation of the tobacco growers, and their predictions are based on a flip-of-a-coin method. Too much of this kind of stuff is printed and it ought to be severely censured. Many elements enter into the fixing of prices of the weed, and year after year the prophets go for naught. It's all bosh! The great tobacco companies are in the best position to say how prices will range, and you don't find any of their representatives issuing announcements of the prices to be paid. The newspapers of the tobacco belts of the country would render a good service to all concerned if they would pay less attention to far-fetched predictions of what prices of tobacco is going to bring. to the farmers and in great measure discredit the value of the newspapers publishing them."

In our minds there is some significance to the article clipped from the Kinston Free Press, quoting Mr. J. D. Archer, a Richmond tobaccoist, in which the gentleman seeks to deny the public the privilege to even talk about what the price of tobacco for this season will be. Evidently he figures that it is none of the farmer's business even what the price of his tobacco will be.

We infer from the language of this gentleman, Archer, that he believes, if a thought about what the price of his tobacco will be should come across a farmer's mind, he should immediately dismiss the thought as what he would get for his crop is none of his business. And judging from the way Mr. Archer expresses himself that in case he does think about it, he should do so while he is alone and as a suitable time we suggest to the farmer, an hour between midnight and day when he sits alone at a curing barn, watching the thermometer with nothing to revive him except the gleam of an occasional shooting star that may be cast across his heavy and weary eyes. Then will he be permitted to hope for high prices for his crop and guess what they may be, provided he does not speak about it to his neighbor the next day.

We would suppose that he, Mr. Archer, thinks it would be proper for the farmer to warn his wife and children that they had better not think about what they would get for their tobacco while they are handling it

faithfully weeks before it is carried to the market, when they are looting, banding, curing and finally grading it for the sale and he should make it all to them that in case they do think about it, to keep it to themselves for it would not please the great tobacco companies for them to talk about what is none of their business.

Mr. Archer intimates that the great tobacco companies are the ones to know how the prices will range and that they will keep their own counsel and the producers and others should do the same.

VITAL NEEDS

What is most needed in this country is the inculcating of the right ideals in the mind of youth, a stern parental discipline, a respect for authority, a willingness to shoulder responsibility and face the facts. Moral beauty, moral courage, strength of character, an appreciation of real values, and the backbone to draw a line and walk by it are the things that will redeem the country and the race.
