

ZEIDMAN AND POLLIE SHOWS STAR ATTRACTION AT ASHEVILLE

Organization Has Built Up Shows On Basis of Good Clean Amusement.

The following, taken from the Asheville Citizen, has to do with the Zeidman and Pollie Shows that are to play the Roanoke Fair here October 20 to 24th.

"The one great fault of the Zeidman and Pollie Shows which opened on Biltmore Avenue under the auspices of the Modern Woodmen of America last night, is the fact that there is almost too much show. Every individual attraction presents such an alluring 'front' that one wants to see them all and that is almost an impossibility in one evening.

As a result of the avalanche of amusement this reviewer only had the opportunity of visiting just a few of the concessions but those few were evidence enough that Asheville is being visited by an honest-to-goodness, sure enough carnival attraction.

The lot which has been selected for the attraction is well filled with a varied assortment of rides, concessions, minstrel shows, aquatic exhibitions, mind reading, sensational motor cycle and auto racing, an animal exhibit, a side show of freaks, in fact about every thing that comes under the category of outdoor amusement and a few things that heretofore have only been seen in vaudeville.

While all shows were not visited last night, those that were seen were good, clean wholesome entertainment and the others had the appearance of being of the same class. Seldom have we been more thrilled than we were in watching Irene Dare drive an automobile at a perpendicular angle about a wooden bowl and equally thrilled by Joe Dovich doing the same stunt on a motor cycle. That one thrill in itself is sufficient for an entire evening.

A rather pretentious offering is presented in a show called "Superba." This is a combination of art studies, dancing and embellished by a clever mind reader. Special lighting effects serve well to set off the art studies which have to recommend them and are not in the least suggestive or smutty.

The category of productions being displayed on the grounds includes such attractions as Elita Louise Blake's "Superba," Irene Dare's Auto

Prome, Ethel Dore's Water Circus, Gordon's Freak Animals, Naif Corey's Lucky Boy Minstrels, Trained Wild Animal Circus, the Ramsey Family of Acrobats, Monkey Hippodrome and all sorts of merry-go-rounds and ferris wheels.

Not since the days of Frank Bostock and his carnival have we witnessed an attraction of the proportions of the Zeidman and Pollie shows and it is indeed refreshing to note that with all the uproar against "smutty" and crooked carnivals that there is one still touring that has every aspect of respectability and decency.

These shows must be good or they would not have secured the contract at the Kentucky State Fair at Louisville last week, their appearance there is sufficient guarantee of their worth. The Woodmen are to be congratulated on their selection.

If you care for amusements of this sort we most heartily recommend this carnival.

PERMITTING DOGS TO RUN AT LARGE AT NIGHT A MISDEMEANOR

SECTION 1880—Consolidated Statutes. No person shall allow his dog over six months old to run at large in the

night time unaccompanied by the owner or by some member of the owner's family, or some other person by the owner's permission.

Any person intentionally, knowingly, and willfully violating this section shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined not exceeding fifty dollars or imprisoned not exceeding thirty days, and shall also be liable in damages to any person injured or suffering loss to his property or chattels.
