Nearly six thousand people will vote in Martin county in the November election. Starting at the top, this number will help elect a President and so on down the line. While it is of great importance that every voter should vote for his choice from the highest office to the lowest, there is a little over half of the voters in our state who do that. A vote is a vote no matter where you go, and everyone is counted from Maine to Florida and from the Atlantic to the Pacific. Every citizen who is eligible should vote.

The election, when narrowed down to our county, can almost be determined now, provided everyone votes in the election. And while the outcome of the election is all but known, there are issues to be voted upon, the outcome of which is not to be known until the votes are counted. The issue we have in mind is that of the County Farm Demonstrator.

We are sorry to say that there are citizens in our county who are bitterly opposed to a county agent for our county. Just why this is, we are a loss to say. Resorting to facts in the case, the agents in our county have benefited the county many more times than what their salary amounts to. This alone should be evidence enough to decide in favor of a county agent. You can help decide this question, will you do it?

Well, here's the way it has been being handled in many cases, the car that was blocked would stop, allow the other car to pass and then drive to the left in order to pass the pedestrians. If the driver of the block-

ed car would have speeded up and waded into the crowd and killed several his action would be condemned and he would have to suffer the consequences. It certainly is strange how some people will face danger like that and at the same time blame an innocent driver when an accident happens.

Last Sunday an over-sized negro rushed out and got the number of a car that she thought had run down the child and while so doing uttered words of contempt for the driver.

Several have been killed or injured on this street within a distance of a few blocks, and instead of letting past accidents be an example, many ignore them and try and make the situation even more worse.

The town limits extend to the railroad and the sidewalks extend just around the curve at the warehouse.

A sidewalk could be marked off at little expense and by so doing, the danger that now exists there would be greatly decreased.
