## Announce Rules and Regulations for County and Group Contests

to understand the peculiarities of the voice of the pronouncer.  
VII. See paragraph on awards.  
Primary Grades (1-4) Story-Telling Contest B

1. Every school in the county will take part in this contest.  
2. Contestants must be selected from grades one, two, and three. In a 5-month school any child in the first four grades is eligible.  
3. No child should have a story that requires more than 5 minutes in the telling.

4. Any story may be used, but the child should tell it naturally, as he would tell the story of a reading lesson and should not try to memorize a word for word. It is recommended that the story be selected from Currier's "Children's Literature" or from any reading books used during the year. This is not an elocution or reading contest.  
5. Each school is entitled to have one representative for each teacher, not to exceed three, at the group-center preliminary. The winner at the group-center preliminary will represent the group center at county commencement.

6. No individual prizes will be awarded. Ribbons will be given of group-center contest and county commencement. Also points will be awarded at county commencement as in spelling contest above.

Arithmetic Contest C  
1. The grammar grades (4 through 7) children from all of the schools will compete in this contest.  
2. This contest will be used in both the group-center preliminaries and at the county commencement. The winner of each group-center contest will go to the county commencement contest.

3. In the group-center contests each school will be entitled to one representative.  
4. The contest will be based on accuracy and speed in the four fundamentals: Addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division.  
5. The committee on arithmetic or superintendent will explain how contest will be conducted in case you do not already know the method used.  
6. Ribbons and points will be awarded winners in this contest as stated above.
