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The Surest Crop in the World

WE HAVE gathered a few figures of all the wealth in the United States from the Investment Bankers Association of America, in which they claim the dollar to be the surest crop in the world. The entire article follows:

What is the surest crop to plant? Is it wheat, cotton, tobacco, corn, or vegetables? Is it ginseng or some other freakish plant? No! It's the dollar, planted in safe investments. So planted, its interest yield is the surest crop known, and it accumulates greater fortunes than does the planting of any other crop. Few people realize how rapidly money accumulates when planned safely at 5 or 6 per cent. That is why so many people fail to get ahead.

As an example of how money grows consider the famous widow's mite of the Bible. Assuming that her mite was the smallest coin used in the United States, the penny; if it had been invested at 5 per cent semi-annual interest and the interest-reinvested at the same rate, the widow's mite would have grown into \$563,594, 100, 456, 246, 000, 530, 000, 000. That sum is vastly greater than all the money in the world. The total

of all the wealth in the United States is estimated at between \$320,000,000,000 and \$550,000,000,000.

The widow's mite is, to be sure, an extreme illustration. A more practical example is the \$50 a month a man 25 years old may save. If he buries the money, in thirty years—when he is 55 years old—he will have exactly \$18,000. But if each month he puts \$50 into a saving account at 3 per cent interest he will have \$29,113.52. If he invests it at 5 per cent, he will have \$41,608.82 in thirty years; and if he invests it at 6 per cent, he will have \$50,227.67.

Many sensible people despise small savings and the accumulations of 3 to 6 per cent. They do not realize that it is the one sure way to get rich. It has made more people rich than oil, steel, or any industry you can name. The sure way to plant an income crop is to put money regularly into a savings account and then, as it accumulates, to invest in safe 5 or 6 per cent securities, bought, after slow and thoughtful consideration, of banks or other security dealers known in the community to be honest and reliable.
