Ordinance Forbids Dogs to Run at Large

The following ordinance is intended to protect the citizens from mad dogs or those liable to go mad during the hot weather and mad-dog season; so please keep your dogs securely confined to your own premises, or be fined:

NORTH CAROLINA, MARTIN COUNTY, TOWN OF WILLIAMSTON, N. C.

Whereas, owing to the fact that a large number of dogs in the Town of Williamston have recently been bitten by a mad dog, the following ordinance was unanimously passed at a called meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Williamston, which was held in the Mayor's Office July 16, 1925.

That from and after the date hereof and for and during the next following ninety (90) days hereafter, no dogs be allowed to run at large in the Town of Williamston unless the same are securely muzzled and chained and accompanied by their owners. All persons violating this ordinance shall be fined for the first offence not more than five dollars, for the second offence not more than ten dollars, and for the third and all other offences not more than twenty-five dollars.

All other ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby suspended for and during the time this ordinance shall be in force and effect. It is so ordained, this 16th day of July, 1925.
