The sixty-five per cent cash advance to members in the South Carolina belt has compared so favorably with the auction floor average that as a result of an almost unanimous appeal Association officials were persuaded to reopen the books and give to non-members an opportunity to profit by delivery of their 1925 crop to the Associ-
