In compliance with the wishes of a petition signed by a necessary number of qualified voters of Powell school district, which was duly approved by the board of education of Martin County, and in accordance with the provisions of Article 1 of the new

School Code of 1925

Notice is hereby given that the election will be held at Old Powell Schoolhouse, in Powell School District, on the 16th day of November, 1925, in said Powell School District, which is described hereinafter, for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the qualified voters of said district as to whether a majority of such voters favor the levying and collecting annually of a special tax with which to supplement the funds for six months public school appropriated by the board of education, and annexation of Powell School District to Gold Point school district, the rate of said special tax not to exceed a maximum of 30 cents on the \$100 valuation of all property, real and personal, within the bounds of the district, described as follows:

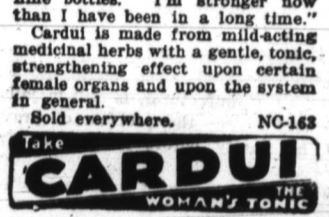
