EAST CAROLINA "TELLING THE WORLD"

"Eastern Carolina Tells the World" is the title of a neat 64-page journal just published by the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce. Mr. N. G. Bartlett, a hard-working, good-natured, smiling fellow, is secretary and manager, and has succeeded in enlisting 46 counties, all in the eastern end of the State, into this valuable organization. Mr. Bartlett has his headquarters at Kinston.

The campaign of publicity has reached across the continent and millions are turning their eyes to the land "where life is worth living." The activities of the organization have taught the people of eastern Carolina one very important lesson which they have overlooked for two centuries. It has been the habit of our people to look at the advantages of others and not our own; as good, and many times better, than theirs.

The work of the Eastern Carolina Chamber of Commerce is trying to show us our own opportunities, so that we will stop bewailing, howling, and whining about our own poor condition and go to work to develop our own fine section of this great country.

THE MITCHELL TRIAL

The Mitchell court-martial is apparently bringing to the surface some of the tricks of the Army. In selecting the officers to constitute the court of inquiry it appears that three members of the court were disqualified upon prejudicial grounds. It would seem rather strange in conducting a court of inquiry that men who were biased should be selected to give an impartial hearing and yet this happened in the case of Colonel William Mitchell.

Colonel Mitchell may have acted hastily in his criticisms, yet there are few who doubt the truth of his statements. And when three of the court are found incompetent on account of prejudices, it naturally makes the public think that there is more faults in the Army—and Navy, too—than even

Colonel Mitchell has told. Mitchell has at least proven two things: First, that he will not run; and second; that he will fight. Let Mitchell, the Army, and the Navy all have a fair fight.
