NATIONAL HEALTH AIM OF RED CROSS PROGRAM

Nurses Guard Community Health; Home Hygiene and Nutrition Featured.

The increasing appreciation by the American people of the value of a national health structure is reflected in the comprehensive machinery built up by the American Red Cross and kept in constant operation in the past year, in the interest of national health.

Instruction in home hygiene and care of the sick, in nutrition; inspection of school children, the maintenance of an effective nursing service, all formed a part of the Red Cross organization assisting in keeping America well.

Altogether 51,121 students were instructed in home hygiene and care of the sick, including 21,439 school students, of whom 20,251 received certificates. This work reached the Girl Scouts, Camp Fire Girls and Girl Reserves; also telephone companies, public and private schools, community and industrial groups. An unusual fact of this service was its adaptation to the needs of the blind, through transcription of the text book in Braille print.

The year's work also demonstrated a growing understanding and appreciation on the part of Red Cross field representatives, chapters, co-operating agencies and others, of the place of nutrition in community programs, looking to community health.

There were 1,000 dietitians enrolled during the year; regular nutrition instruction reached 125,000 children; 20,363 adults attended nutrition meetings, while 1,426 schools were aided in furnishing lunches.

Co-operative relationships were established with various Government and educational agencies in making this branch of the Red Cross health work more effective.

Another of the health-promoting activities of the Red Cross lies in the public health nursing service. There are nearly 1,000 such nurses serving in every part of the country.

As an invaluable resource in time of a great national emergency, there is enrolled under the Red Cross banner a reserve of 45,000 nurses. In a number of disasters during the past year in which the Red Cross has aided, and where the services of the nurses were required, they have been among the first to mobilize.

At Lorain, O., last year 24 enrolled Red Cross nurses were engaged in relief work, while 124 were employed in the mid-west tornado disaster relief operation of this year. The work of Mrs. Dorothy Davis Gleicher, a Red Cross public health nurse stationed at Fairbanks, Alaska, in checking a flu epidemic at Port Yukon, in the Arctic, has won praise from all who know of it.

It is to assist in maintaining such valuable services to the community that the American Red Cross invites members during its fifth annual sell out, November 11 to 26, the only such appeal which the Red Cross makes in the year.

No appeal is so international as that to the humanity of every people. The sum of \$1.50 from a Japanese boy in Tokio to the Santa Barbara relief fund speaks a world of friendship, sponsored by the American Red Cross.

(Continued from first page) tion, and arranged to buy liquor. That he went back, bought a Coco-Cola bottle full and paid him a dollar for it. He stated that he did not drink. On cross-examination Mr. London said Ellison agreed to furnish a load of liquor at prices ranging from \$5.50 to \$8.00 a gallon, according to quality.

R. J. Horton, Federal prohibition agent from Chatham County, declared that he was in Gawk on November 4 and 5. On the night of November 4 he, in company with the other agents, saw Ellison sell liquor to an old colored man and they also bought a dollar's worth. He testified that on the morning of the fifth they found a half gallon of liquor in Ellison's place, captured it and destroyed it. Other agents testified to the same general facts.

Ellison did not offer any testimony, but through his attorneys put up the same old fight, introducing and injecting prejudice in the jury box. After all the testimony was in the attorneys for both the State and defense addressed the jury. After which court adjourned until Friday morning at 9 o'clock, when the case will go to the jury following the charge of the court.

(Continued from first page) Williams and wife and occupied a room there.

In a few days it came to the knowledge of both Mrs. Manning and Mrs. Perry that they had been imposed on, and they proceeded to go after the protection the law guarantees against these deeds.

Warrants issued from this county were sent to Washington County for service. When arrested Williams was at the home of the Phelps girl. He succeeded in furnishing bond in the sum of \$1,000, but his bondsman turned him over to the sheriff because of rumors that Williams was preparing to skip.

At the trial Thursday the State put on Mrs. Perry and Mrs. Bell Manning, who gave in detail the transactions as to their claim to be man and wife.

Sheriff Reid, of Washington County, described Williams' denial of the crime when arrested, and that later—on Sunday—he admitted his guilt, said that he knew the Phelps girl and that she was 21 years old.

Hon. Carl Bailey, of Roper, was put on the stand and stated that Williams lived in Roper, that his wife was 45 or 50 years old and lived with him.

Mr. Kemp, also of Roper, testified that he knew Williams to be a married man and that he lived in Roper. Williams did not put on any testimony.

The court adjudged him guilty and sentenced him to the roads of Edgecombe County for the term of 16 months. Williams gave notice of appeal to the superior court to be beginning December 14. The court fixed his bond at \$1,000 for his appearance, and upon his failure to furnish the bond he was remanded to jail.
