It is folly for the farmer to do more field work. He has made himself poor already by working too hard and producing too much.

The farmer sorely needs to know more about his market, in which alone his prosperity lies.

The coffee farmer of Brazil and the East Indies can't raise enough coffee to break the market, simply because he knows how to sell.

The rubber growers can't produce enough rubber to break the market. He sells his customer his needs at the price he names, not the customer's price.

The American farmer is the only man on earth that fights his neighbor

in business. It seems impossible to get them together, and if they happen to get together they are the quickest people of all to break their agreement.

The sad thing, from the farmer's position, is why work when he has piled up such a surplus that the world can't use it? Why buy fertilizer to make more crops to make lower prices?

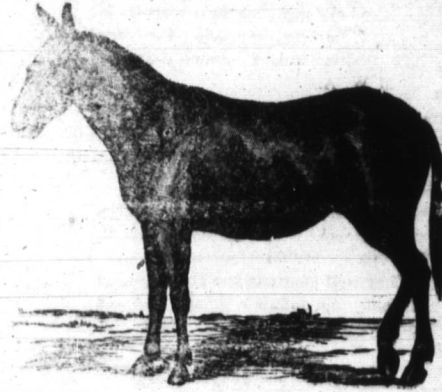
