TEN-ACRE TOBACCO CROP BRINGS \$6,000.00

(Clipping from The Raleigh News & Observer) "Kinston, N. C., Nov. 12th.—A ten-acre crop of Tobacco on the farm of J. E. Mumford of Pitt County has paid him more than \$6,000 this fall. He has received more than \$600 per acre for the production in spite of the early season slump. Most of the \$6,000 represented profit to Mumford, according to warehouse acquaintances here, since he is a "live-at-home" grower, producing his own pork, grain, and other necessities."
