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**A GREAT VICTORY FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT**

The famous Gawk liquor cases were finally concluded Wednesday in re-construct court here, when a jury returned its verdict of guilty against all of those who had not already pleaded guilty.

This a great victory for law enforcement.

Conviction was not sure as the case was hard fought and everything possible was brought in to both prejudice and mystery the case.

The officers who made the raid had decoyed the entire gang together to make a big party and while there in the act of delivering the goods they were arrested with 70 gallons of liquor.

The defendants tried to work the old-time gag of unfair methods being used in their capture, but that did not go with the jury, the members of which knew that it was not only the privilege of the officers to detect and catch offenders of the law in any way possible but it was their sworn duty, and that law-breakers can't complain when they are outwitted by officers whose duty it is to put down illegal acts.

Another point the defendants stressed was that the officers, all being strangers, did not know them by name, which was of course true; yet they arrested them in the illegal act, and of course the jury knew it was not necessary to know names. It was only necessary to see the individual in his illegal occupation, which constituted the crime.

The court sentenced each of the offenders to from 5 to 15 days in jail, except M. M. James, who had sickness in his family, and each defendant was required to pay a fine ranging from \$50 to \$150, the aggregate amount of the fines amounting to \$1,000, besides the costs of the trial. The jail sentences totaled 110 days in jail.

The court might have made road sentences against each defendant, but considered that it would operate against their farming operations. He thought the costs, fines, and humility of jail sentences from 5 to 15 days would have as much moral effect as longer road sentences.

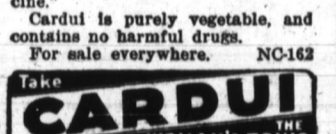
