CAN YOU ANSWER THESE THREE QUESTIONS, MR. FARMER?

Only twelve Texas farmers stood on their feet in a large gathering recently when called upon to answer three questions, as follows:

Have you corn in the barn of your own raising?

Have you meat in the smoke house which you raised yourself?

Have you money in the bank you did not borrow?

If the same three questions should be asked of any large gathering of Martin County farmers there might not be even a dozen that could answer them affirmatively. When farmers learn that meat in the smokehouse is worth more than money in the bank they will be better off.

Why should we overwork ourselves to raise big crops of tobacco, cotton, and peanuts to reduce prices on those products and then have to buy corn, meat, and hay? And yet that is what we see and hear on every hand—big acres, heavy fertilizing, when they should know that big crops mean little prices.

STATE BOARD HEALTH TO HELP MARTIN COUNTY

Since nearly every child is afflicted with some form of tonsil, tooth, eye, or nose disease the State has found it to be one of its best investments to examine all school children as often as once each two or three years for such diseases.

They are now engaged in examining all the schools in the county, both white and colored, where each child up to the high-school age is examined entirely free and treated if necessary.

Miss Geneva Sykes, who conducted such a work in this county three years ago is making the examinations and states that there will be a free clinic held about the middle of May, when operations for adenoid and tonsil diseases will be performed and treated.

This will be entirely free, unless the parents of the child are able to pay, when the nominal charge of \$12.50 will be made.

In the clinic held here three years ago there were 125 operations, every one successful.

If our people cooperate as they should the benefits to be gotten from this service can not be counted in dollars and cents.

Miss Sykes or Dr. W. E. Warren, county superintendent of health, will give all the necessary information as to the time and place when and where the clinic will be held.

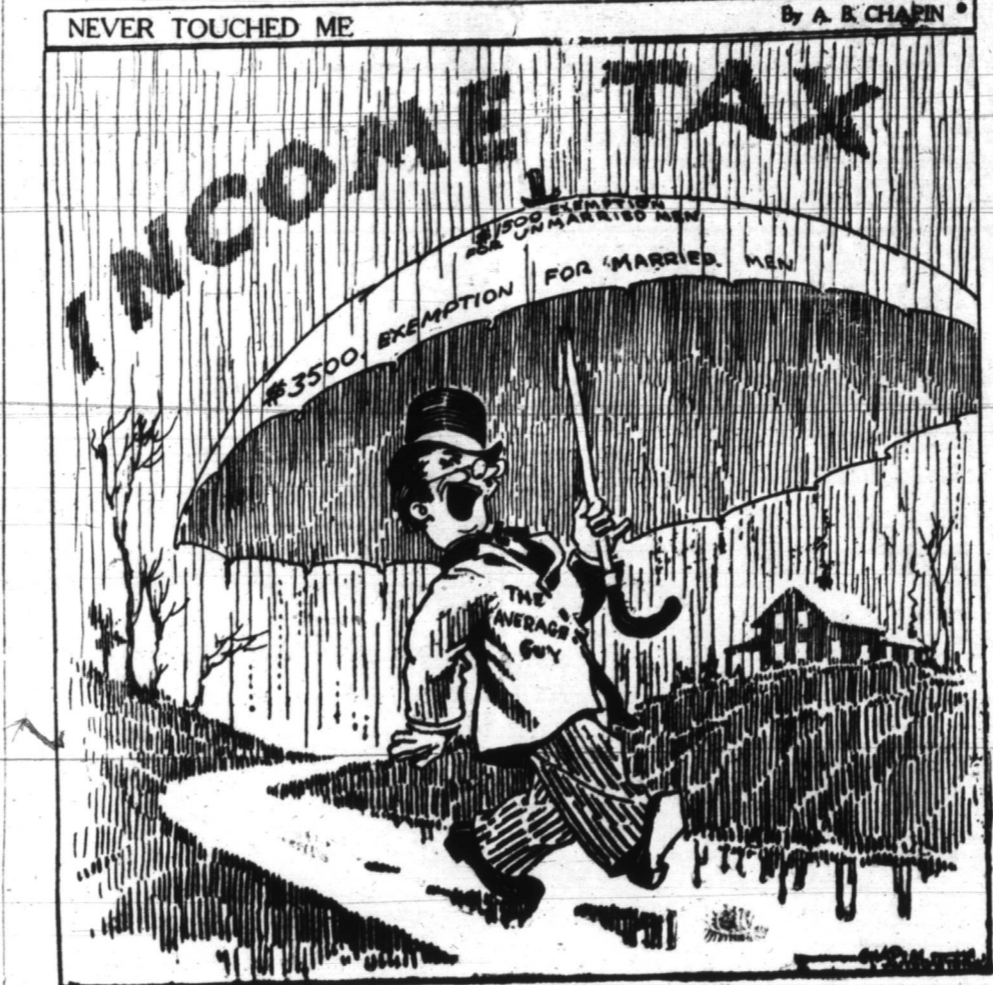
