## The Most Profitable Fertilizers for Cotton

One of our most successful planters says, "For seven consecutive years I have made paying crops of cotton despite weevils and rains. Fertilizers, Nitrate of Soda and Acid Phosphate, have helped me more than any other one thing. With the boll weevil here I would not try to raise cotton without them. On average land like mine, they mean the difference between profit and loss."

This man began seven years ago by using 200 pounds of Acid and 100 pounds of Soda per acre. He increased this gradually each year as experience warranted. Last year he used 600 pounds of Acid and 400 pounds of Soda on about half of his crop.

"On the average," he says, "every dollar I have spent for acid and Nitrate of Soda has brought me four to five dollars in net profit."

He attributes this to the large acre yields produced by these fertilizers and the consequent low cost of producing each pound of cotton, together with the fact that Soda and Acid make the crop ahead of the weevil; they eat squares faster than the weevil can get them.

It is not to be inferred that these rates of application would be advisable under all conditions. This particular planter has experimented continuously to determine the most profitable system for his own place, but he has found that as a rule his net income has grown as he has used more Nitrate and Acid to set the cotton earlier and increase his acre yield.

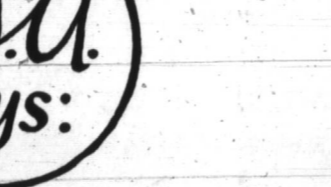
