NOTICE OF SPECIAL ROAD TAX ELECTION—BEAR GRASS TOWNSHIP

North Carolina, Martin County.

Under and by virtue of an order passed by the Board of Commissioners of Martin County and entered at their regular session Monday, May 3, 1926, notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the usual voting place in Bear Grass Township, Martin County, North Carolina, on Saturday, June 5th, 1926, for the purpose of taking the sense of the qualified

voters of the said township on the question of whether the board of commissioners of Martin County shall levy and collect annually a special tax for the purpose of improving and maintaining the public roads of said township.

Said tax levy not to exceed 30 cents on the \$100 worth of real and personal property, according to the tax list of said township.

At the election those qualified voters who are in favor of said proposition shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words, "For special road tax;" and those who

are opposed to said proposition shall vote a ballot on which shall be written or printed the words, "Against special road tax."

Said election will be conducted at the same time and place, and by the same registrar and judges of the general Democratic primary, it being the place and date above stated, and under the rules and regulations as are not provided for in the election of members of the general assembly under the general election laws of the State.

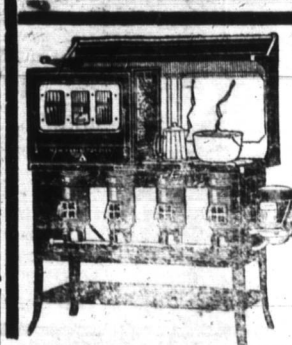

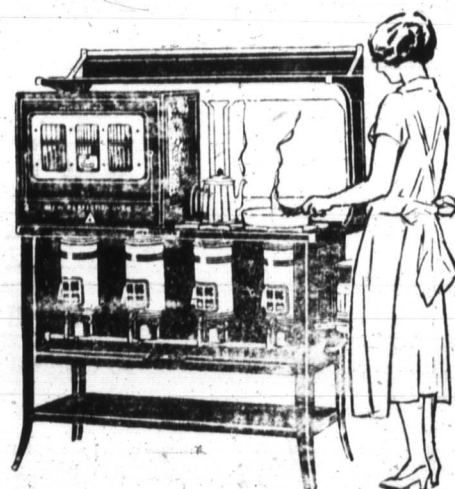
