171 Hardware Dealers Defendants in Suit

One hundred and seventy-one hardware dealers, scattered throughout the South and members of the Southern Hardware Jobbers association were named as defendants in a suit filed in the federal court at Richmond Va., Monday, as violators of the Sherman Anti-Trust Law.
