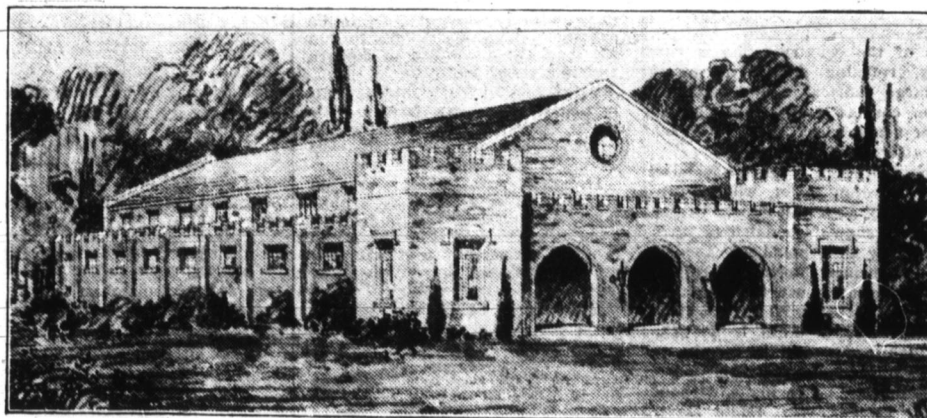
Celebrates Sixteenth Birthday

New Gymnasium at Georgia Military Academy Largest Among Prep Schools



The above sketch shows the new gymnasium of the Georgia Military Academy at College Park, Ga., which is now being finished for use during the fall term. This building is going up in the literal shadow of G. M. A.'s oldest edifice, Founder's Hall, in which Col. J. C. Woodward founded the institution twenty-six years ago. Colonel Woodward, who is a noted southern educator, has been president of G. M. A. throughout its existence, and it is largely due to his untiring efforts that the school has grown from a beginning of forty students to one of the twelve "Honor Military Schools" of the nation, as designated by the United States War Department, with a campus of ten buildings.

The new gymnasium shown above is 145 feet long, 63 feet wide, and has a gable height of 30 feet, with 20-foot parapets. It is the largest gymnasium existing in southern preparatory circles.
