## Robersonville Womans Club Meeting Tuesday

Robersonville, Sept. 23.—(Special to The Enterprise.)—On Tuesday afternoon, September 14, the Woman's Club met in the home economics room of the school building at 3:30 o'clock. There was a large representation of the members present. During the hour much business of interest was disposed of through special reports and committees.

Of special concern locally should be the motion made by Mrs. H. A. Gray that action be taken to rid the town of the type of weed that causes or irritates hay fever. It was suggested that every citizen be responsible for cleaning up his back lot and that the board of commissioners be asked to have the streets cleaned. A committee was appointed to interview the

commissioners and to secure their cooperation.

Mrs. V. A. Ward, W. R. Jenkins, and Thos. Roberson were appointed as a committee to find out just what the attitude of the business men is relative to a local Boy Scout movement, and to see what subscriptions they could get for such an enterprise.

The president, Mrs. V. A. Ward, read a letter from the district president, Mrs. J. M. Hobgood, of Farmville, insisting that the Robersonville Woman's Club send as large a representation as possible to the district meeting to be held in Belhaven on October 14. Mrs. Ward expressed a desire that as many as could attend.

Suggestions were made as to a permanent meeting place for the club. The house committee will look into the matter and report its decision as early as possible.

Mrs. Walter Sumner was heartily welcome as a new member to the club.

After the regular business session Miss Trentham, the county home demonstration agent, gave a demonstration in lamp-shade making. She showed much ease and naturalness and insisted that she was only too willing to be of real service to the community whenever she might.

There were seven local visitors and two from Williamston, Miss Trentham and Mrs. Thigpen.
