

EPISCOPALIANS PREPARE FOR BISHOPS' CRUSADE

Local Rector Is Head Commission in Diocese

Announcement is made of the selection of a group of distinguished North Carolinians to serve with the 200 crusaders, who, early in January, 1927, will lead a nation-wide crusade which the Episcopal Church is about to launch to reawaken its membership throughout the United States to their duties and responsibilities as churchgoers and citizens.

At the head of this group is the Rev. Thomas C. Darst, D. D., Bishop of East Carolina, to whom is due the suggestion for the proposed crusade, and upon whom has fallen the honor of leading and directing it. Proposing such a religious campaign at a special meeting of the House of Bishops of the church three years ago, it was first endorsed by the House, and later at the general convention of the church in New Orleans in 1925, unanimously approved. A national commission was accordingly appointed by the presiding bishop of the church, of which Bishop Darst was made the chairman, and early last summer the Diocese of East Carolina, at the request of Church leaders, released the bishop from his duties as head of the Diocese of East Carolina in order that he might give his entire time to the direction of the crusade from the national headquarters which have been established in Washington.

Two Hundred Leaders

Plans for the crusade have rapidly gone forward, and the list of the 200 outstanding leaders of the church who will serve as crusaders is now practically complete. It includes, in addition to Bishop Darst, three other well known leaders in the Diocese of East Carolina—the Rev. William H. Milton, D. D., rector of St. James Church, Wilmington; the Rev. F. D. Dean M. D. also of Wilmington, who has charge of St. Andrews Church at Wrightsville and Dr. George B. Elliott, a well-known Wilmington layman; the Rt. Rev. Edwin A. Penick, D. D., Bishop Coadjutor of North Carolina, the Rev. Thomas F. Opie, D. D., of Burlington, and Rev. George F. Rogers, D. D., of Asheville.

Connected with the Bishops' Crusade so-called because it is a movement in which the bishops of the church have taken the leadership in a campaign which it is believed will mark the beginning of a new epoch in the life and history of the church, are comprehensive plans for a great spiritual stock-taking and mobilization of forces unique in the history of religious organization. It will combine unusual and dramatic features. The leaders point out that no 'revival' is intended, nor is there any effort in mind to raise funds or add new members from other faiths. With dignity commensurate with the cause, the effort will be concentrated upon a 'rededication' and 'reconsecration' of the present membership to the

principles upon which the church is founded.

Local Rector Heads Commission

A commission of which Rev. Clarence O. Pardo, rector of the Church of the Advent, Williamston, is the chairman, has been named by Bishop Darst to organize the diocese for participation in the crusade in cooperation with the national commission. Mr. Pardo is now completing plans for the preliminary period of the crusade, which will be inaugurated on St. Andrews Day, November 30. On that day in every Episcopal Church in this diocese and throughout the country there will be a continuous prayer service for the success of the crusade, which will be followed by similar services in the various parishes, culminating on January 6, when the crusade will be formally launched. Thereafter, during the ensuing two months, 200 leading bishops, priests, and laymen and women of the church will go forth to strategic points in groups of twos and threes, and hold meetings, conduct conferences and special services and by other efforts seek to stir the membership to a realization of their duties in present-day world conditions. The crusaders will appeal to the spiritual convictions of the people, and in addition stress the obligation of every professing Christian to stand up and be counted, emphasizing particularly the value of a practical application of Christian doctrine to the vexed problems of international relations, capital and labor, the divorce evil, better civic government, etc. It is planned to be a demonstration in force of the potency of the Christian faith and church in the modern world and an answer to the charge that the church does not meet the needs of the generation.

Branch organizations similar to that in this diocese have been formed in all of the eighty-odd dioceses. Reports from Washington indicate an enthusiastic reception of the idea of the crusade everywhere. Meanwhile plans are going forward for the follow-up on the crusade, which, from the point where the 200 leave-off, will be carried by other workers into every city and village in the United States.




N-O-T-I-C-E OF TAXES



Objectives


- Confession of Christ openly before men as Lord and Saviour. "Not only with our lips, but in our lives."
