

Minstrel Revue Here Thursday

For all around mirth provoking entertainment of the side-splitting variety and jazzy harmonious music of the kind that rings in your head for days and just won't let your feet be heavy, Bob Hoggard's "Carolina Black and White Revue," which comes to Williamston for an engagement on November 25, can't be beat.
