GREENVILLE PUTS BAN ON ALL PUBLIC DANCES

Greenville, Jan. 3.—In addition to receiving the resignation of Mayor D. M. Clark, and the election of J. C. Lanier as his successor, the board of aldermen in adjourned session elected one new alderman and passed several important ordinances, including one prohibiting subscription dances in Greenville.

An ordinance making it unlawful to operate a public dance, commonly known as a script dance, within the corporate limits of Greenville, was unanimously adopted. The ordinance carries a fine of \$50 for each offense and empowers officers of the law to close any such dances that may be attempted.

Another ordinance places a privilege license tax of \$1,000 on jewelry auctions and peddling, and a like tax on the auction or peddling of medicines on the streets or elsewhere about the city.
