WASHINGTON COMMISSIONERS RECOMMEND HIGHWAY ROUTE

Plymouth, Feb. 11.—At a joint meeting of the board of county commissioners and the board of road commissioners of Washington county, held here Monday, a resolution was adopted recommending to the State Highway commission that highway No. 97 should run southwardly along the Long Acre road to the Beaufort county line and thence on to intersect Route 91.

It was decided that a larger number of people will be benefited and a larger area of developed territory covered by the Long Acre route than by any other road connecting Washington and Hyde counties.
