TENOR THANKS HEAVEN

There is one tenor in the world, at least, who doesn't claim to have started the world at the age of three with a perfect performance of Il Trovatore. He is Giovanni Martinelli, the great singer-actor of the Metropolitan whose voice will be heard in recital at the Eastern Carolina Exposition, Rocky Mount, April 4th, at 8:30 p. m. Martinelli is, in fact, a late-discovered genius. Like Harold Bauer, who thought he was destined to be a violinist until he was turned by circumstances to the piano, Martinelli thought that his musical talent, if any, were for wind instruments. He was an accomplished player on the humble clarinet, and the mere accident that a judge of voices was passing his window one night when he was singing an aria from "La Tosca" made him use his voice for the pleasure of the whole world.

A clarinet player, however, seldom is ranked as a child prodigy, and Martinelli was brought up in the ordinary fashion of all country children in rural Italy. His rugged figure now is the result of this simple life, and his variety of interests, his ability of talk of other things besides his music and himself, his being a complete human being and good citizen, in short, are all due to the fact that no fuss was made over him when he was a child. Martinelli has two children and swears that if they have any talent for music he will see to it that the talent is developed. But he swears with even more intensity that no single talent is going to be played up to the detriment of his children's health or diversity of interests. According to Martinelli, a musician of any sort ought to be interested in everything except music for a long time in order to be a great interpreter of the thoughts and feelings of humanity.
