"Setting Hen" Cause of Loss in Egg Production

The longer a broody hen is allowed to sit on the nest the longer it requires to get her back into laying condition, and consequently the greater the loss in egg production. To break the hen from sitting put her in a broody coop, where she can be prop-

erily fed and watered. The broody coop should have a slat bottom in order that the air may circulate from beneath, thus keeping the body of the hen cooler, thereby tending to break up the hen's broodiness.
