State Library Aid
The application for State library aid for the elementary school, as sent in by Supt. R. A. Pope, has been approved by the State inspector of elementary schools, Miss Susan Fulghum. Scientific Club Organized
The four science classes (general science, biology, physical geography, and chemistry) of the Robersonville High School met after school October 10, 1927, for the purpose of organizing a scientific club for the school. The meeting was called by T. R. Jenkins, teacher, and officers for the

club were elected. The purpose of the club was also discussed.

Officers elected were: President, Hallie James; vice president, Wiley Rogerson; secretary and treasurer, Ethel Cherry.

It was decided that there should be three committees appointed by the president and the teacher. The three committees are: (1) Constitutional committee; (2) Program committee; and (3) social committee.

The purpose of the club is to create an interest in science and to furnish an opportunity for the students to get recent information concerning it.

All members of either of the science classes of the Robersonville High School are eligible as charter members, but later the requirements for membership will be based upon scholarship in science.

It was decided that the club should meet each Tuesday night. Subjects concerning general science will be discussed one night, chemistry next, etc., alternately, thus giving the students new information about all the sciences which are taught in the school.

New Flag for School
