T. B. Slade, jr., of Hamilton, was in town Thursday.

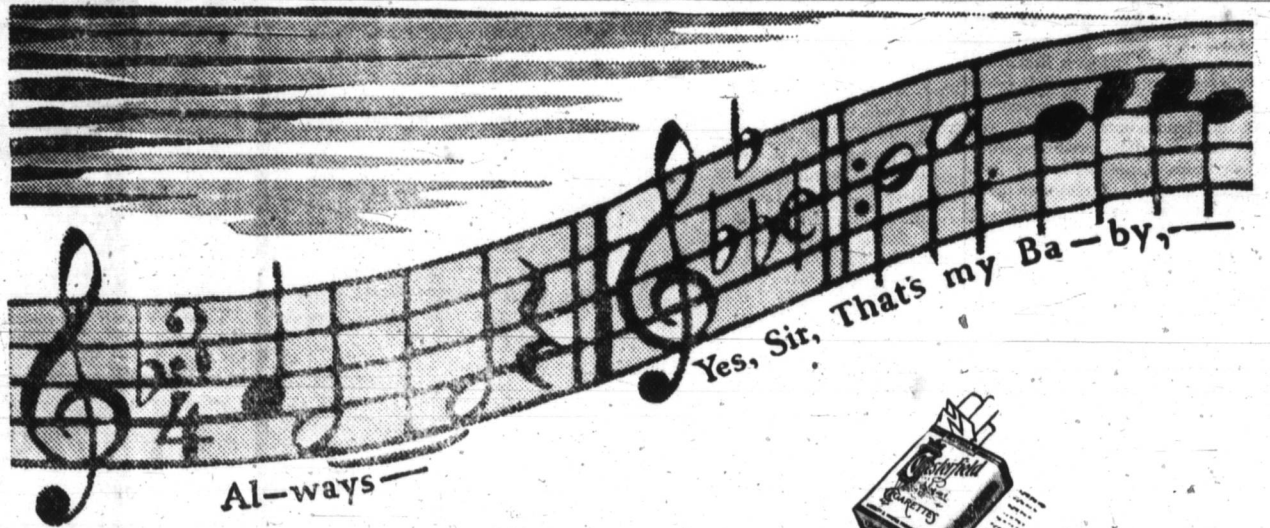
