

Have To Get Married To Find Out It Costs to Live

W. O. Saunders writes in his paper, The Independent: "I had a letter last week from Billie who married a few weeks ago. 'I would like so much to come home for Thanksgiving,' she said; 'but it costs so much to go any place.' 'Poor little kid; she's nineteen years old and getting well on into womanhood, but this is the first time in her dear young life that she ever counted the cost of anything. She had to get married to find out that it costs money to go any place. 'They never wake up until they get married. Marriage is a great school-master. Marriage teaches one more in a month than parenthood can teach in decades. 'Marriage is the great educator. Most young folk have to get married to learn that it costs money to go anywhere; and that food costs money; and clothes cost money. Everything costs money, but the youngsters have to get married to find it out. 'But maybe it is well for the social order that they don't find out so much before they are married; there are few enough marriages now; if every matrimonial prospect knew as much about marriage as the married ones already know, there might be fewer marriages still.'"

Tarboro Boy Attacked by Water Buffalo in Africa

Tarboro, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Lena Martin has received information in regard to the injury of her son, Frank, by a buffalo in Loanda, Africa, recently, and the account of the attack by the fierce animal on her son shows that he had a miraculous escape from instant death. He suffered the infliction of ten different injuries on his body by the beast. The buffalo inflicted two serious and painful wounds on the young man, one being a puncture near the right lung and the other a fracture of the left knee cap. Friends will be glad to learn that he is recovering satisfactorily from the throwing him around on the ground as injury. He is in the employ of the Sinclair Oil Refining company and was with a party of geologists exploring for oil when they saw a herd of buffaloes. Young Martin got a gun and fired on them, injuring one of the animals which became so enraged that it attacked Martin savagely, a cat would throw a mouse. There was not a gun in the hands of any other member of the party and they were at the mercy of the enraged beast for some moments. Finally the buffalo, in making a charge, tumbled in a ravine, falling upside down and becoming so wedged therein that others of the party were able to rescue Martin from his perilous position. As soon as he fully recovers he will return home. The injured man is a relative of Mrs. Wheeler Martin here.
