

POWER FARMING ON INCREASE IN EAST CAROLINA

84 Tractors Sold In This Immediate Section In Last Two Years

Farming methods are changing from the mule and small plow to tractors and modern equipment, as diversified farming replaces the old one-crop system in eastern Carolina.

"The sale of 84 modern tractors of a standard make a small territory adjacent to Washington, Beaufort County, during the last two years is but one good indication of the change being made in farming in that section," says A. T. Holman, agricultural engineer at State College. "Small tractors have been used on many North Carolina farms during recent years. The chief use, however, has been in preparing land for planting. Recently the field of the tractor has been broadened to include the planting, cultivating and harvesting operations."

Mr. Holman states that successful diversified farming requires the use of good farm machinery, and the tractor that is adapted to planting, cultivating and harvesting as well as for plowing, disking and belt work is finding a warm reception among farmers.

The New Holland Corporation of Hyde County is now operating some 16 tractors on its farm. Each of these tractors, states Mr. Holman, is used in plowing, disking, planting, cultivating and harvesting on 100 acres of land. Next year, the plans are to use 32 tractors on 3,200 acres comprising part of the bottom of old Lake Mattamuskeet. This corporation will also use the combine to cut, thresh, and sack the soybean crop. Two men can operate this machine with little loss of time.

Mr. Holman states that the use of the tractor and its equipment is rapidly growing and that this is but another sound indication of the progressive farming ideas that are being adopted over the whole State.

STATEWIDE FARM ORGANIZATION IS TALK OF AGENTS

Do Not Question Benefits, But Adequate Support Is Doubtful

While farmers of North Carolina admit that a statewide farm organization built by the consolidation of community and county organizations will be greatly beneficial, they are doubtful as to the financial support that will be accorded such an organization.

"This is the general opinion of the 125 extension workers who gathered at State College last week for their annual conference and school. The county agents especially appeared reluctant to commit the farmers with whom they work to this organization. Some of the agents had the specter of the late lamented tobacco association before them when they reported that they would not want to be personally responsible for the success of the organization in their counties."

This view of the agents was upheld by the results of a survey made of leading farmers. Replies were received from 823 men who had been questioned by the extension service. Most of these replies indicated a need of the proposed organization and stated that the signers would join the organization and that it would be supported in their home communities; but there was a rather sharp division when the question of dues and financial support was answered.

In discussing the matter before the agents, Dean I. O. Schaub, in charge of agricultural extension work, stated that the agents could not be permitted, under the law, to go out and perfect such a proposed organization of farmers. The agents can assist the farmers to do their own organizing and may help to get the movement started, but the actual organization must be done by the farmers themselves.

This question of farm organization was one of the principal matters coming before the county agents in their joint conferences. Much time was devoted to a study of all existing national organizations.

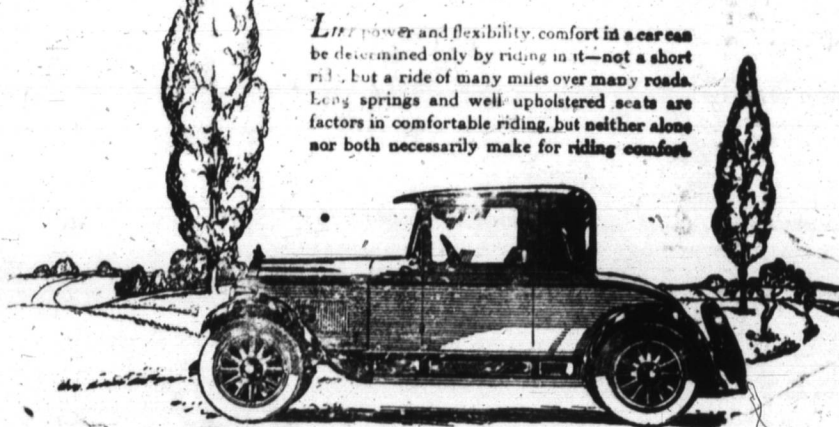
