**CANCER NOT CONTAGIOUS**  
**No Instance Recorder of Once Cancer Causing Another**  
In spite of the fact that physicians and nurses have come into intimate contact with cancer patients for so many years and taken no precautions against infecting themselves, there is no recorded instance of one case of cancer giving rise to another.  
This is not to say that microbes are never found in cancers. Discoveries are announced from time to time that bacteria have been identified with cancer, but upon full and impartial investigation it is always found that these parasites have been invaders of the cancer growth, followers rather than producers of the malignant condition.  
Cancers often become infected with such microbes as infect wounds of any kind, and the unpleasant odors which are sometimes associated with cancer are due to these accidental contaminations. Consequently the precautions to be taken by those who come into contact with cancer patients are only such as should be followed with infected wounds.  
There is no occasion to shun a person who has cancer, so far as danger of contracting the disease is concerned. The victims need all the sympathy and tenderness which can be shown them. Fear that cancer is contagious has sometimes led to unnecessary and uncharitable action toward the sick.

**NOTICE OF A SPECIAL TAX ELECTION IN KEELS SCHOOL DISTRICT, MARTIN COUNTY.**  
In compliance with the wishes of a petition signed by a necessary number of qualified voters of Keels School District, number 34, white, which was duly approved by the Board of Education of Martin County, and in accordance with the provisions of article 17 of the new school code of 1923.  
Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the school building of said district on the 25th day of June, 1928, in said district, which is described hereinafter, for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the qualified voters of the Keels School District as to whether a majority of such voters favor the levying and collecting annually of a special tax with which to supplement the funds for six (6)

months public school appropriated by the board of education, and annexation of Keels school district to Robersonville school district, the rate of said special tax not to exceed a maximum of 33 1-3 cents on the \$100 valuation of all property, real and personal, within the bounds of the district, described as follows:

Beginning in the forks of the road in front of the Keels school house in the Robersonville Grade School district line, and running southwest with the road and the Robersonville Graded school district line to Great Branch; thence with Great Branch and the Robersonville Graded School District line South to the public road that runs from the old Everett Mill bridge to the Washington and Robersonville road; thence easterly with the said public road to the S. T. Everett land line; thence southeasterly with S. T. Everett land line to the run of Tranters Creek or Colly Swamp; thence northerly up the run of Tranters Creek or Colly Swamp to the old Charles Spruill line of the Robersonville Graded School District line; thence westerly with the Robersonville Graded School District line to the beginning, containing the entire Keels School District as it now is.

At said election those who are in favor of the levy and collecting annually of a special tax of not more than 33 1-3 cents on the \$100 valuation and the

annexation of the Keels school district to Robersonville School District shall vote a ticket on which shall be written or printed the words, "For local tax"; and those who oppose the levy and collection annually of a special tax of not more than 33 1-3 cents on the \$100 valuation and annexation of Keels School District to Robersonville School District shall vote a ticket on which shall be written or printed the words, "Against a local tax."

That Mr. T. L. House be and is hereby appointed registrar, and Mr. Jasper Johnson and Mr. S. T. Everett are hereby appointed poll holders for said election.

That a new registration is hereby ordered and that the registration books will be open for such purposes beginning with the 15th day of May, 1928, and will continue open until the 16th day of June, 1928. The registrar will be at his home during the above dates for the purpose of registering all those qualified to vote in said district.
