MAKE POOR FARM SUPPORT SELF IN ONE N. C. COUNTY

Alexander County Farm Is Built Up Until About on Self-Supporting Basis

The success of the farm demonstration agent in Alexander County in helping to place the county home farm on a self-supporting basis is now being used as a good illustration of the value of extension work in that county.

'I have known this farm for a number of years,' says E. S. Millsaps, district agent for State College in the Piedmont section, 'and I have never seen a place that has been brought up more rapidly. Formerly the institution was poorly managed. But it was placed under the control of the county commissioners who hired a manager and then placed the supervision of the place under County Agent D.

Advertisement for ATTENTION TO DOG OWNERS. Includes text: 'The following town ordinances will be strictly enforced from this date:', 'SEC. 7. No dog shall be permitted by its owner to roam at large on the streets between the first day of April and the first day of September of each year.', 'SECTION 1. It shall be unlawful for any person owning, keeping, or harboring any dog in the Town of Williamston to allow such dog to be upon or in any street, public alley, public building, or public place in the Town of Williamston, unless such dog be vaccinated against rabies and wear a license tag, or unless such dog be secured by chain or rope or securely muzzled. Any person who shall violate the provisions, or any of them, of this section shall, upon conviction, be fined ten (\$10.00) dollars for each violation.', 'SEC. 2. It shall be the duty of the Chief of Police of the Town of Williamston to impound any dog running at large in the Town of Williamston, whose owner or keeper has not complied with the above section of this ordinance. Dogs which have been impounded shall be held for a period of four days, during which time notice of its impounding shall be given by one insertion in some newspaper circulating in the Town of Williamston. A dog which has been impounded may be redeemed by the owner or keeper upon payment of the sum of two (\$2.00) dollars and the cost of advertisement. Any dog not redeemed within-four days from its impounding shall be sold after three days' notice, posted at the courthouse door in Williamston, or shall be destroyed in some humane manner.', 'This 26th day of July, 1928.', 'R.
