

RECORDER HAS BUSY TUESDAY

 vis. LeRoy Lloyd, Richard Johnson, and Jesse Rogers paid \$5 each and the costs, while Richard Latham and Willie Clifford had their cases not crossed. Jasper Rollins, charged with an assault with a deadly weapon, plead guilty of a simple assault. The plea was accepted and judgment was suspended for nine months upon the good behavior of the defendant. He was given 30 days in which to pay the costs of his case.
 The case charging Isaac Sutton with an assault was continued.
 Charged with an assault with a deadly weapon. John L. Wynn and Edgar Ayers plead guilty of simple assault and judgment was suspended upon their paying the cost.
 Hezekiah Bailey plead not guilty to carrying a concealed weapon and assault with a deadly weapon. In the first cause the court found him not guilty, but in the second he was de-

clared guilty. Twenty-five dollars and costs, with a four months suspended sentence hanging over him constituted Judge Bailey's offerings.
 Lee Purrington plead not guilty of an assault with a deadly weapon, but the court found him guilty of an assault on a female. A ninety days road sentence was meted out, but Judge Bailey suspended it upon the defendant's good behavior.
 A nol pros was returned in the case charging James Peel with an assault with a deadly weapon.
 In the case of Sam Roberson, tried the preceding Tuesday, the judgment rendered at that time was ordered off the books and in its place a twelve months road sentence was inserted. The last seven months are to be suspended upon the defendant's good behavior. Roberson was found guilty of driving an automobile while intoxicated.
 The court found Don Johnson not guilty of larceny and receiving.
 A nol pros with leave was returned in the case charging Kelly Ayers with an assault with a deadly weapon.
 Probable cause of guilty appearing

in their case, Paul Bullock and Louis Ayers, charged with housebreaking and larceny and receiving, were bound over to the next term of Martin County Superior court for the trial of criminal cases, under bonds of \$500 each. Both Bullock and Ayers are just young boys and are said to have entered a small store near Robersonville and made away with a slot machine and other goods.

Robert Williams, charged with violating the stock laws, plead not guilty to the charge, but the court, after hearing the evidence, found him guilty and suspended the judgment upon

his paying \$5 damage to the prosecuting witness and the costs of the case. Earl Stevenson was fined \$100, charged with the costs of his case and lost his right to drive a car during the next 90 days when he plead guilty of driving an automobile while he was intoxicated.

Ed Walston was found not guilty in the case charging him with carrying a concealed weapon.

Evidence was heard in the case charging J. G. Godard with violating the stock laws and the case was continued one week. The defendant entered a plea of not guilty.

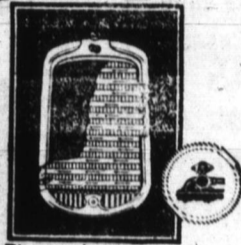
