

## RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN GENERAL FEDERATION OF WOMEN'S CLUBS AND THE STATE FEDERATION

The General Federation of Women's clubs is 3,000,000 strong. It is the mother organization of the State Federation, and upon its plans of organization and operation our State organization is patterned. The programs, working plans, etc., for committees and departments are furnished the State regularly through the corresponding channels of the General Federation. Any information desired by any Club, or club women, in any state may be secured through the General Federation headquarters. Speakers, who through any other bureau, would cost from one to two hundred dollars, will be sent from the General Federation for only traveling expenses. This General Federation is not only a national asset, but it has acquired international influence.

Let us here in North Carolina put away forever the thought that the General Federation of Women's Clubs is a far away organization, located up there at our national capital something remote in which we have little interest.

How is this organization financed? Like all similar organizations, it is supported by dues. There was a time when each club was assessed 25 cents dues each year for the General Federation. Each club, whether large or small, paid the same 25 cents. As the club movement spread, and the activities of the organization increased, there came a demand for increased income. The directors of the club movement are now asking every club woman to pay 10 cents per capita for dues to the General Federation. But, strange to say, there are only 16 clubs in North Carolina whose members are willing to pay the 10 cents per capita. Mrs. McKee, who is Director of the General Federation for North Carolina, thinks the reason for this, is because the women do not understand their relation to the General Federation, nor their obligation to it. Thirty states of the forty-eight, have adopted Universal Membership, that is, they are paying 10 cents per capita for every club woman in their state organizations. According to a new ruling, states will not pay the 25 cents per club dues to the General Federation. In other words, the only dues paid this year to the General Federation from North Carolina will be the dues from the 16 clubs paying the 10 cents per capita to the General Federation, while 265 clubs will not pay a penny.

Do you not feel that we owe our General Federation our financial support? More money is actually coming into North Carolina each year from the General Federation than we are paying to it.

With these facts before you, Mrs. McKee hopes that the State organizations will respond to her appeal in large numbers, and will decide to adopt the plan of putting into our General Federation as dues the 10 cents per capita. This is a matter which must be decided by each club.

To quote from Mrs. O'Berry's letter to the President: "In making your decision whether or not you will take out direct membership, you should not regard it in the light of an obligation resting upon you, but as an opportunity to have the direct contact with the General Federation
