Notice of a Special Tax Election in Cooper's School District, Martin County.

In compliance with the wishes of a petition signed by a necessary number of qualified voters of Cooper's School District, number four (4), white, which was duly approved by the Board of Education of Martin County, and in accordance with the provisions of Article 17 of the New School Code of 1923,

Notice is hereby given that an election will be held at the school building of said district on the 22nd day of May, 1929, in said district, which is described hereinafter, for the purpose of ascertaining the will of the qualified voters of the Cooper's School District as to whether a majority of such voters favor the levying and col-

lecting annually of a special tax with which to supplement the funds for six (6) months public school appropriated by the Board of Education, the rate of said special tax not to exceed a maximum of 25 cents on the \$100 valuation of all property, real and personal, within the bounds of the district described as follows:

Beginning in the northeast corner at a line where the Jamesville School District intersects Poplar Run School District; running with this district boundary to Ange School District line, then southeast to Griffins Township line; thence with Griffins Township line to the Williams Township line to the Jamesville School District line; thence with the Jamesville School District line to the beginning.

At said election those who are in favor of the levy and collecting annually of a special tax of not more than 25 cents on the \$100 property valuation with which to supplement the funds for six (6) months school, shall vote a ticket on which shall be written or printed the words, "For Local Tax"; and those who oppose the levy and collection annually of a special tax of not more than 25 cents on the \$100 property valuation and supplementing the funds for six (6) months public school shall vote a ticket on which shall be written or printed the words "Against a local tax."

That Mr. C. E. Simpson be appointed registrar and Mr. Carroll

Brown, and Mr. Ferd Holliday are hereby appointed poll holders for said election.

That a new registration is hereby ordered and that the registration books will be open for such purposes beginning with the 5th day of April, 1929, and will continue open until the 11th day of May, 1929. The registrar will be at his home during the above dates for the purpose of registering all those qualified to vote in said district.
