"Will Civilization Stand?"

The following extracts from a sermon preached by Rev. D. A. Petty, pastor of the Methodist Church Sunday morning, have great significance, because the subject "Will Civilization Stand," is one full of world concern and well summarizes the subject.

Mr. Petty pointed out modern conveniences, industry, education, and government as typical of twentieth century civilization. He said in part:

Will Civilization Stand?' is no idle question. Thinking people everywhere are asking it. Five leading English historians four years ago spent several months together in asembling all the facts and in answering this question. They concluded that it can not stand without a means of transforming the hearts

"The greatest danger menacing our age is the abuse of the achievements of science. Mastery over the forces of nature has placed in the hands of twentieth century man powers that he is not prepared to exercise. General Swinton of the British Army has said We have developed germs which can be dropped on armies and cities so that it is now possible to blot out a nation in a day.

"Thomas Edison said, "There is no way of preventing a flotilla of airpianes flying over London tomorrow and spreading a gas that would poison its millions in three hours.' When Napoleon marched on Moscow he traveled at the rate of four miles a day. When Nelson sailed in search of the French fleet he sailed five miles an hour. Our slowest airplanes travel a hundred miles an hour. Our fast ones make two hundred miles an hour. Science has opened two new empires to the modern man-the empire of the air

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of the sea by the submarine. "The germs discovered by science may be used by the medical profession to save life, or by a war-mad nation to destroy millions. The things that make our civilization may be turned to destroy mankind. It was done for the Greek nation; for the Romans; and

by the flying machine, and the empire of the corners

for the Germans. "Here is where the Christian church comes in. Unless the development of Christian and moral character catches up with the development of scientific endeavor, humanity will destroy itself. Dr. Charles E. Jefferson says, 'If the church doesn't end war, man will end the church.' If the Christian church of the world so preaches and teaches Jesus Christ as to change the hearts of people, the achievements of science will be used to heighten our civilization. Thre is no conflict between science and religion. Science gives laws and facts. Religion gives interpretations and values of those laws and facts. Jesus Christ can save our civilization. But 'There is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved."

Modern Woman

Is the modern woman responsible with as much of the modern trouble as she is charged? What is generally designated as the modern woman is not the young, painted, silly, vain, flapper, because there is hope for such. But the modern woman is the one who puts the iron heel on the husband's neck and challenges his liberties to speak or to spend for himself. She governs with the iron hand at home and forces-her husband to spend beyond his capacity, and frequently drives him to-the penitentiary or to suicide.

She spends the day sleeping and lounging while the husband works, and the children, if by chance there are children, roam around in the care of a nurse who does not teach them the things they should know. And then when it comes time for the husband and children to get that needed rest and sleep, many of the modern women are just getitng their eyes open, ready for the night clubs of various and sundry kinds-generally good, but sometimes good.
