SAYS SOUTH IS NATURAL HOME FOR LIVESTOCK

Mild Winters and Long Growing Season Are Factors
Because of its mild crops, long growing season, ease of producing forage and feed crops, and lack of seed for expensive housing, North Carolina and the South is the natural home for all classes of livestock. No other section of the world can compete with the South if farmers will take the matter seriously and go into the business. This was the tenor of all discussions at the 17th annual meeting of the Southern Livestock Association held at State College on January 7, 8, and 9. Homer Hancock, president of the Association and former commissioner of Agriculture for Tennessee, delivered the keynote address. He pleaded for the production of more livestock to raise the profits from southern farms, to make the soils more fertile and to ultimately raise the standards of living in rural sections. He gave as his own experience that a livestock program had been followed for more than 80 years on the farm that he now owns and as yet no mortgage had ever been placed upon the land.

Commissioner W. A. Graham and others, speaking before the association, pointed out that Southern farmers must continue to grow the cash crops with which they are acquainted, but that also livestock is needed to furnish a market for surplus feed and to provide a better living. Many of the lectures were technical in nature, but most of them were of great interest to the average farmer. Talks by Dr. Clarence Poe, R. L. Shuford, D. J. Lybrook, H. B. Arbuttle, J. H. McClain, and others were directed to the point and given from the actual experience of farmers.

The livestock meeting was attended by some 150 experts from all sections of the South. The farm agents and a number of visiting farmers swelled the attendance during the week and it was declared one of the most successful meetings in the history of the body. GUANO NEEDS OF VARIOUS CROPS

A series of eight circulars containing fertilizer recommendations for the various types of soils of North Carolina and the leading crops has been prepared by C. B. Williams, H. B. Mann, and A. S. Cline, of the North Carolina Experiment Station at Raleigh. Copies of the circulars may be had free of charge by writing C. B. Williams, at State College.

Circular 34 deals with Currituck, Camden, Pasquotank, Perquimans, Washington, Tyrrell, Dare, Beaufort, Hyde, Craven, and Pamlico Counties. Circular 35 deals with Craven, Carteret, Jones, Onslow, Duplin, Sampson, Pender, New Hanover, Bladen, Brunswick, and Columbus Counties.

Circular 36 deals with Hertford, Gates, Perquimans, Chowan, Washington, Bertie, Martin, Edgecombe, Halifax and Northampton Counties. Circular 37 deals with Surry, Stokes, Kinston, Caswell, Person, Granville, Vance, Yadkin, Forsyth, Guilford, Alamance, Orange, Durham, Davie, Davidson, Rowan, Cabarrus, Stanley, Montgomery, Moore, Randolph and Chatham Counties.

Circular 41 deals with Cherokee, Graham, Macon, Swain, Jackson, Madison, Avery, Clay, Haywood, Henderson, Buncombe, Yancey, Mitchell, Watauga, Ashe, and Alleghany Counties.

It should be noticed that parts of some counties are included in more than one circular.

What Fertilizers Can Not Do

(From American Fertilizer)
Fertilizers can not take the place of humus. There can be no substantial plant growth without bacteria in the soil, and bacteria can not survive without humus. Most of the plant food in commercial fertilizers becomes available to the growing plants only through the intermediate action of these bacteria. Many farmers overlook the importance of maintaining an adequate amount of humus in their soil. A cultivated crop should never follow a cultivated crop without a cover crop during the intervening winter. To omit the cover crop is to reduce the returns from the fertilizer used the second year.
