FAVORS LICENSE OF CAR DRIVERS

Stae Highway Patrol Chief To Ask Legislature for New Law

Raleigh, July 15.—Captain Charles D. Farmer, commandant of the State Highway Patrol, expressing himself as highly pleased with the work of the patrol during its first year, announced today that he planned to ask the 1931 general assembly to require a driver's license for every person in the State who operates a motor vehicle.

Captain Farmer pointed out that in addition to the increased element of safety, if every driver was tested as to ability to operate an automobile the new law would also increase revenue, said that he would also advocate a highway patrol of 200 men. The present consists of 37 men.

Under Captain Farmer's plan all persons now driving cars would pay \$1 for a license, all beginners would pay \$2 and all chauffeurs would be charged \$5 for a license.
