Urge Farmers to Keep Pasture Weeds Down

Observation of pastures in the county shows that many farmers need to use the mowing machine to keep weeds down. The pasture should be mowed two or three times during the season if necessary to keep down weed growth. Certainly the weeds should not be allowed to mature seed to increase the weed crop next season. Some of the pastures contain bitter weed. If taken hold of in time this pest can be easily stamped out but it allowed to mature seed it gets worse each year. This pest is a weed that usually grows 12 to 15 inches high and has yellow blossoms in the top and it eaten by cows causes the milk to be bitter. Close grazing with cattle helps in keeping down weed growth. Observation of a number of pastures in Bertie county shows that close grazing causes a heavier sod to be formed and this in turn helps to keep weeds choked out. A few sheep in the pasture are valuable to keep down weeds.
