**THE INCREASING IMPORTANCE OF ALFALFA**  
 And again has alfalfa demonstrated that it is the one dependable hay crop in a season of severe drought when other hay crops fail. You may sometimes lose a cutting but never a crop. Let's have one or more acres of alfalfa on every farm. Talk this over with County Agent T. B. Brandon and with him visit the farm of some successful grower.

Wilbur J. Fraser, of the University of Illinois, writing to Hoard's Dairyman:

"When cheaper milk is made, Alfalfa is the feed that will make it. Lack of lime on acid soil and lack of alfalfa are impoverishing the dairy regions of the eastern half of the United States because dairymen must feed large amounts of expensive grain in order to supply their dairy cows with sufficient feed, especially protein. This big expense frequently cuts in half the profit they might be making if they raised and fed liberal rations of good alfalfa hay.

"How many dairymen know that if a cow is fed such liberal rations of good alfalfa hay that she does not have to clean up more than half of the stems, she is consuming about 20 per cent protein feed which it would cost him many times the expense of his hay to purchase in the form of protein concentrates?

"When large amounts of high protein alfalfa hay (at least 16 pounds per day for Holsteins and 12 pounds for Jerseys) are fed as the basis of the winter dairy ration, supplemented with succulent corn silage and a little home-

grown grain, the dairy cow has everything she needs to keep in good flesh and condition up to the production of 350 pounds of fat a year.

"High quality, rich roughage is the fundamental basis of economic milk production and will be the necessary basis for the most profitable milk production in the future."
