Coffield lands, on the South by Mamie

Milk: 1 pint to 1 quart daily. Vegetables: 3 servings daily, cluding 1 starchy vegetable, such as potatoes; 1 leafy vegetable, such as collards, cabbage, turnip greens; and other vegetable, such as beets, carots, onions.

Fruits: 2 servings daily, fresh, caned, or dried.

It is also advised "Be sure to use a aw fruit, a raw vegetable, or canned omatoes daily.

Eggs: 1 daily

Meat (lean): 1 serving daily, pork, beef, mutton, poultry, or fish.

Whole grains: 2 servings daily; breakfast cereal, such as oatmeal, cracked wheat; bread, as cornbread, whole wheat bread.

Fats: 2 tablespoonfuls of butter daily in addition to other fats in food. Sweets: 1 serving daily Water: 6 to 8 glasses.






