had free range with only occasional interruption from farmers in that part of the county.

Last October, the idle land was brought to the attention of the northwestern cattlemen, and Messrs. G. H. Harrison and R. L. Coburn secured data and placed them before Mr. Thompson at his home. In February, this year, Mr. Thompson made a preliminary study of the possibilities of developing the land for cattle raising. In April, Mr. Vogel made a preliminary study of the land and its possibilities. Public surveys were hired and after several months, a copy of the deed was secured. Mr. Thompson coming here a few days ago to make the land purchase.

The undertaking is no small one. Thousands of dollars will be needed to develop the project and it will be many months after actual drainage work is started before any returns can be expected, it is believed. Martin County people are much interested in the undertaking and wish for both Mr. Thompson and Mr. Vogel a great success in handling the project.

### HOME AGENT'S MAY SUMMARY

Agent Forms A Tenth Club With Women In Farm Life District

The Martin County Home Agent travelled 903 miles over the county during the past month conducting ten meetings with the women in the clothing and millinery projects, 97 women attending in all. Eleven meetings were held with the girls, 152 of them attending during the period. The girls' clubs have had "Meal Preparation in the Steam Pressure Cooker," this month and in each club a simple dinner was prepared, the girls acting as guests and cooks.

The district meeting was held in Greenville May 6 with 22 women, representing five of the ten clubs, in attendance. There were 197 attending the meeting from the counties of Martin, Pitt, Beaufort, Tyrrell and Washington.

The county health contest was held during the month and the girl selected from each club for the best health was in Williamston where Dr. J. H. Saunders gave them a free examination for the purpose of selecting the

healthiest girl in the county. Two girls received a tie score, and they went to Washington for a second examination. Miss Naomi Harrell was rated very high, her score being only four below the highest recorded.

One new club at Farm Life was organized with the women during the month, bringing the total number of clubs in the county up to ten.

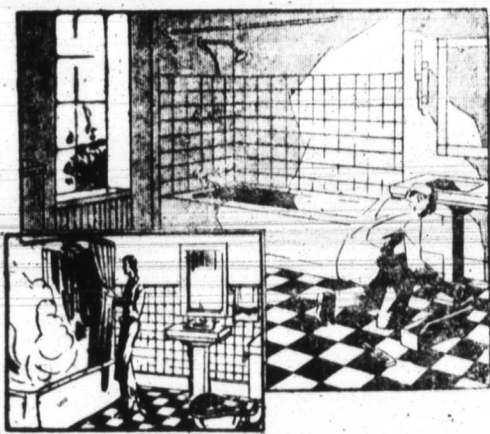
The women on the curb market took in a total of \$148.14 during the month.
