C. T. JOHNSON, OF NEAR HAMILTON, DIED THIS WEEK

Prominent County Farmer Had Been in Ill Health For Some Time

C. T. Johnson, 57 years old, died at his home on the Roebuck farm, near Hamilton, Monday afternoon at 5:30 of cancer of the stomach. He had been in ill health for some time.

The son of the late Joshua Johnson and wife, Mr. Johnson was born in this county and farmed most of his life. He was a member of the Primitive Baptist church for a number of years.

Mrs. Johnson with four children, Misses Ruby and Julia Johnson, and two sons, Ernest and Bruce Johnson, survive. He also leaves two brothers, Charlie and George Johnson, both of this county, and one sister, Miss Florence Johnson, also of this county.

Funeral services were conducted from the home Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock by Elders Cowin and Grimes and interment was in the cemetery.


