Rushing Peanuts To Market

Practically all the peanut buyers in the country had to stop buying the latter part of last week, because they could not weigh as fast as the peanuts were being rushed on the market. The price can not possibly go up with this condition prevailing.

Farmers ought to know that the buyers can not handle the crop in a rush, and that when the farmer shows so much anxiety to sell the buyers are going to take the peanuts at a low price.

Buying and Selling

It is strange that buyers go wild to buy when prices are going up, and sellers go crazy to sell when prices are going down.

If the peanut farmer will market his crop slowly, there will be no reason for the prices to go lower. On the other hand, if farmers keep rushing them on the market, the price may go to nothing.

It is very important for all farmers who can hold or store their peanuts to do so. It will help the price.
