Moon Rocket Placed on Exhibition in New York

New York.—A 7-foot rocket which, when completed, will be shot off in the direction of the moon, is being constructed in New York and was exhibited for the first time on Thursday night when the American Interplanetary Society met at the Museum of Natural History.

The rocket has not been completed, according to G. Edward Pendray, vice president of the society, but it should be ready for its voyage into space by April.

It is fueled by liquid oxygen and gasoline and is equipped to land gently by aid of parachutes. It is built of aluminum and aluminum alloys.

The purpose of forthcoming tests will be mainly to demonstrate and try out various devices developed by the society in its efforts to perfect a means of reaching the moon or some other planet by rocket.

YOUTH DIES AT DARDENS FRIDAY
