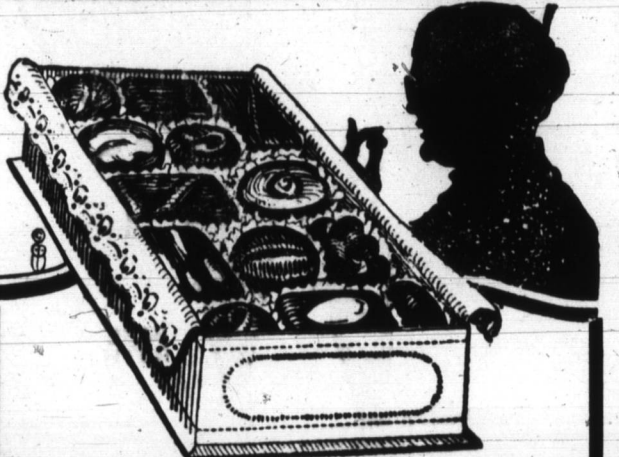

The calculation of the legal reserve as computed by the Actuary of the Company has been verified and all other liabilities have been duly provided for.
