support him, whoever he may be, for I know he will be better than Hoover."

In closing his address, Mr. Morrison mentioned the McNinch confirmation, explaining his action apparently to the satisfaction of his audience. "I did not ask the President to appoint McNinch, and after confirming a long list of other appointees throughout the country, I followed the custom and voted for confirmation of McNinch. I knew the man was honest. He was a neighbor of mine, and as long as he raised such a ruckus in the state I thought it would be well to get him out and salt him down. I thought I had made no error, and I was honest in my opinion, but can't you forgive a man if he does make such a mistake once in a while," he pleaded with his hearers.

"I am happy to serve the people, and I will be happy to continue in their service as United States Senator. I would like to carry a banner in my maturity and make a last struggle against the Republican Party," he said, adding that if nominated he would carry the banner against all comers to victory and uphold the principles of the Democratic party. "But the will of the people of North Carolina be done," he concluded.

The Senator explained that he had many speaking engagements this week and that he could not go into all the questions of importance, that he was scheduled to make two addresses daily during the remainder of the week. "While I am away I am paired with another member of the Senate, and I arranged my leave with the steering committee," he explained.

Elbert S. Peel, chairman of the Martin County Democratic Executive committee thanked the people for attending the meeting, and presented Justice J. L. Hassell who eloquently introduced Mr. Morrison, pointing out his record as a supporter of Democracy and his work accomplished in behalf of the people of North Carolina.

MAKES PROFIT ON SMALL FARM

Reports Reveal Number of Farmers Made Money Last Year

Reports received at State College through the North Carolina Bankers' Association indicate that there are good farmers in North Carolina who made money last year despite low prices and unfavorable economic conditions.

In the last few days, Charles A. Sheffield, assistant extension director, has received 63 reports from farmers who are candidates for the grade "A" certificate as sponsored by the Agricultural Committee of the bankers' organization. Mr. Sheffield has been studying these reports so that certificates might be issued to all those making a grade of 80 per cent and above.

A typical example of a farmer who is living at home and making some money is M. L. Adderholdt, of Lexington, Route 4. Mr. Adderholdt owns 106 acres of land of which 80 acres are cleared for cultivation. Last year he sold \$1,707.04 worth of produce from this place as follows: certified small grain seed, \$510; veal and pork, \$199.44; garden vegetables, \$35; sweet potatoes, \$20; Irish potatoes, \$16; eggs and poultry, \$66.60; fruit, \$35; cotton, \$360, and truck crops, \$400.

In addition to these sales, Mr. Adderholdt grows enough vegetables and fruit for the use of his family and some to save for winter. He grows all the grain and forage for his livestock; has enough pork, milk, butter, eggs and poultry for home use and keeps his land in a high state of fertility by growing legume crops. He times about 20 acres of land each year, using about 500 pounds of limestone an acre to keep the soil in a sweetened condition.

The income of \$1,700 is almost clear net cash and shows the possibilities of farming, even during a depression period, when good methods are followed.

Checks for \$89,128 have been received by farmers of Pitt County from the government seed loan fund.
