CONSTITUTIONAL **COMMISSION NOW BUSY WITH TASK**

Variety of Subjects Taken Up At Recent Meeting In Raleigh

Raleigh .- Members of the commis ion engaged in studying recomme tions to be included in a possible rewriting of the state's constitution met here recently to discuss taxation, education, the executive department, the supreme court, public welfare, and justice of the peace courts.

It was announced that the discussion sessions, which required two days completed that phase of the work and that actual redrafting of the constitution would begin at the next meet

The commission has held severa meetings to discuss proposed changes in the basic law of the state, and as a result of the decision to ask law schools of the state to aid in research work has received a great deal of data relating to taxation and courts.

When the commission's work completed it will report to the 1933 General Assembly.

Under a constitutional amendmen to be voted on at the general elections in November, provision is made that thereafter amendments may be submitted to the voters at either general or special elections. The present constitution requires that all amendments be submitted to the people for approval at general elections only.

Display advertising in which the articles advertised are fully described has proved to be the most effective by far. Tests on advertising were made some time ago by the Chicago Tribune. Advertisements in which the descriptions of various articles were limited to one or two lines were run along with others carrying five lines of descriptive matter. The latter proved to have double the response.

Last Spring an Eastern concern made a complete canvass of its trade territory to ascertain the type of advertising with most appeal. Ninety per cent of those questioned were found to favor full description of merchandise together with prices. A few favored price alone and a smaller number favored the general prestige-building type. A merchant who is familiar with his own merchandise is apt to think because he knows every detail of the merchandise that every one else does. That is not true. People like to know just what

Mail order houses discovered this early in the game, and they have gone so far as to illustrate practically every item of merchandise, some in colors, and described to the smallest detail.
